The beaches, park lands and parking lots are closed from 11pm to 6am and is strictly enforced. We have experienced late night activity in the more secluded areas. This results in disturbances to nearby residents, broken glass, trash, and other paraphernalia being left behind.

Crabbing, fishing, swimming, and mooring of boats is restricted to designated areas.

On all Maryland state waters, a personal watercraft may **not** be operated at **greater than 6 knots (6.9 mph)** within 100 feet of any shore, wharf, pier, bridge structure, abutment, or persons in the water. No one under the age of 16 may operate jet skis in Maryland waters...It's the Law!


LTPOA IDENTIFICATION STICKERS

For access to, and parking on, **ALL** community property, owners and bona fide tenants of London Towne are required to permanently display a current LTPOA sticker on all vehicles, boats and trailers.

The schedule for obtaining stickers is posted on the community *calendar* at **www. Itpoa.info**. Rules and regulations are also on the website.

With permits in hand, Arrow Environmental Services will begin the Section Four ramp replacement in the coming winter months. The new apron and ramp will be the same length and width as the existing apron/ramp with the addition of a containment bulkhead at the deep end to prevent washout. The 6" concrete will have a broom finish. In order for the contractor to work in a dry environ, a 130 foot vinyl coffer dam will be constructed. The under-pier portion of the vinyl on the sides will remain under the new supports and decking. The ramps at Sections One and Five will be open during construction.

The area at the Section Four ramp that has been marked off with yellow tape is for installation of electric service at the ramp. This is in anticipation of future plans to include a modernized entry system and improved surveillance and lighting.

LTPOA Public Water Committee Update, Fall 2016



Public water committee members will survey interest in public water from residents along the proposed route (see below). At the beginning of September 2016, each household on the route will receive an explanatory letter with a return postcard to respond if they are interested in public water or not. The results of this survey will be tallied and if 51% of the residents on the proposed route are interested in public water we will begin the process of a final vote among those residents. We will also begin a dialogue with county officials about the cost. As a reminder, the proposed route is:

The intersection of Londontown and Mayo Road to the intersection of Mayo and Oakwood to the intersection of Oakwood Road and Shore Drive. Around Shore Drive past Webster to the intersection of 637 Shore and Bishop to the intersection of Bishop and 700 Londontown Road.

If you live on this route, expect a piece of mail with a return postcard at the beginning of September. If you have questions about the work of the public water committee,

I am happy to announce that our baby oysters did very well last year, even with the frigid temperatures and record breaking snow fall. LTPOA will be participating in the Marylanders Grow Oysters project again this year. The South River Federation will be announcing the pick-up dates and times for the "spat" (oysters that are less than 1 year old) soon. Pick-ups are generally scheduled mid to late September and we are looking for volunteers to assist with the caretaking. Section 3 will place spat in cages and hang them from the main boating pier. Our responsibility is to take care of the spat during the growing season (September to June) by preventing the cages from resting on the bottom, preventing exposure to freezing air temperatures and cleaning weekly by pulling the cages up and down in the water a few times. Our continued commitment and participation helps reiuvenate oyster reefs and the overall health of the Chesapeake Bay and its tributaries. Brown + Green = Clean!

When choosing a bag for your yard waste think brown, not black. If you collect your grass clippings or other yard waste for recycling at the curb, use a brown paper lawn bag designed for that purpose, instead of plastic bags. Yard waste placed out for collection in plastic bags will no longer be accepted beginning January 2017. A major reason for this revision to the program is that composting with plastics can be expensive, time consuming and not environmentally friendly. The ground plastics have to be separated from the yard waste during the composting process. Paper bags will compost right along with the leaves and grass clippings, creating a cleaner more valuable product. Paper lawn bags can be found in most grocery stores, hardware stores and online. Regular paper grocery or shopping bags are not durable enough for yard waste collection.

Thank you for your support and cooperation during the 2016 spring and summer. The Police Officers have done an outstanding job this year protecting our people and property but they could not have been successful without the help from LTPOA residents. The Police

Committee plans to continue coverage during the fall and into the winter months.

The school season has returned so please watch your speed and be especially vigilant during times students travel to and from school. Drivers have to share the road with school buses and extra care should be taken when near buses and always be ready to stop to allow children on and off at bus stops.

As the recreational season winds down and the holiday season approaches please drive safely, drive defensively, and watch your speed. If you celebrate with a few holiday spirits please use a sober dedicated driver to keep you and others alive on the roads and highways.

Please check your LTPOA vehicle and boat stickers and be aware of the expiration year. A valid sticker must be displayed on your vehicle or boat to use LTPOA property or recreational facilities. Please check those stickers!

A question that comes up frequently is "How do I contact LTPOA Police Officers?" If anyone has an issue that should be immediately dealt with by the Police then they should call 911 to report it to the Anne Arundel County Police. Residents should not try to contact me or our Police Officers. When Officers are on duty for LTPOA they are considered in "Secondary Employment" status and the Officers have to keep the County Police advised of where and when they are working and maintain radio contact. If residents call 911, the County will dispatch a regular on duty Officer to handle the call or if no Officer is available they may dispatch the LTPOA duty Officer to handle the call. Either way the County Police know that our Officer is on duty and radio contact will be made if the Officer is in a position to handle the call or assist another on duty Officer. If someone tries to call me there will be a delay getting the problem resolved. Your issue could be handled quicker and resolved directly by contacting the County Police.

If there are recurring problems such as trespassing, parking, vandalism, etc. involving LTPOA property, please e-mail the Police Committee so Officers can be alerted to stay on the lookout in the areas where violations are known to occur on LTPOA property. E-mail to the Police Committee should be sent to **Police.LTPOA@gmail.com** or you can send a text to or leave a voice message for me on (443) 333-9490. Please e-mail pictures of observed improper parking, vandalism, etc. to the Police Committee if possible.




New for 2017 – London Towne Community Hall Building Expansion and Exterior Renovation

PET CORNER Rita Robertazzi

It is the time of year when dog walkers avoid severe outdoor temperatures by walking in the early morning and late evening, often well after dark. Drivers, please watch for pedestrians and

their pets and remember to slow down and give them a wide berth. Just like children, animals are easily distracted and may suddenly cross into your path.

Asphalt roads remain hot to the touch late into the evening which can burn paws and over heat pets. Make sure pets are protected from the sun, have plenty of water, and never leave them in a hot car, even for a short time.

Dog owner etiquette.....when walking your dog and approaching another dog do not assume that you can allow your pet to make contact without asking the other owner. Not all dogs are as friendly and playful as yours and you and your dog could end up in a stressful and potentially dangerous situation. Children should always ask before petting a strange dog.
